# PRINCIPALS REPORT

#### NAPLAN CELEBRATION

I want to congratulate the teachers, aides, parents and students on amazing Naplan results we have achieved again this year, on the back of some very strong results in 2023. This is not achieved without a lot of work, and I'm very proud that our teachers work collaboratively, use current educational research, examine data to support student need, and use each other's expertise to grow professionally. I'd also like to acknowledge all the extra things the staff do to make our school a wonderful place to learn. We have continued our camping programs, HPV, lunchtime clubs, school production, BUPS has talent, BUPS FL just to name a few. The research is very clear that positive learning cultures and relationships are very important to student learning growth.

So that we can put our news into perspective the following information may assist.

Over the past two years Naplan has changed its format to an online platform that is adaptive (that is, it adjusts the questions the students receive based on their answers along the way.)

From 2023, NAPLAN results are reported against proficiency standards, with student achievement shown against 4 levels of proficiency.

- Exceeding: the student's result exceeds expectations at the time of testing.
- Strong: the student's result meets challenging but reasonable expectations at the time of testing.
- Developing: the student's result indicates that they are working towards expectations at the time of testing.
- Needs additional support: the student's result indicates that they are not achieving the learning outcomes expected at the time of testing. They are likely to need additional support to progress satisfactorily.

Similar school groups enable fair and meaningful comparisons between schools with similar characteristics. The characteristics that are taken into account in creating similar school groups are: • Student Family Occupation and Education (SFOE) index • school size • cultural diversity • remoteness

# PRINCIPALS REPORT CONT'D

Network schools refers to all the government schools in the Cardinia Network of schools.

Last year we had excellent results in our Yr 3 cohort with our scores being ahead of the Similar schools, Network Schools and the State scores recorded against the proficiency bands of strong and exceeding.

In year 5 we did not do quite as well though we matched the state and Network schools in Numeracy and Writing and exceeded the state and network schools in Reading.

This year we have shown once again what a strong academic school BUPS is with our results being better than similar schools and Network schools in all areas (with the exception of Yr 3 Spelling)

# YEAR LEVEL REPORTS

#### **PRFP**

Welcome back to a busy Term 3! We hope everyone enjoyed their holidays and are ready for the Term ahead 50 This term, in Phonics, students will continue to learn and practice with sounds at their level, which they need to focus on. They will apply that knowledge to segment and blend the letters together to read words of varying lengths.

During shared reading, students will discuss characters and events from texts, including the structure of narrative texts, identify different types of sentences such as statements, questions and exclamations, as well as identifying nouns, pronouns and verbs.

In Writing, students will apply their letter-sound knowledge to write simple sentences, that includes a 'who' and a 'do', whilst also learning to include adjectives to describe. They will continue to include a capital letter at the beginning, finger spaces and a full stop.

In Maths, students will continue to focus on developing their number sense. They will explore how to represent numbers up to 10 using part-part-whole relationships and will continue to extend their place value knowledge by recognising, modelling and writing numbers to 20. Students will use a range of mental and written strategies to solve addition and subtraction problems. Students will also use informal units to explore the concepts of length, mass and capacity.

In our Inquiry unit, ' Our Sustainable World', students will explore different actions which help sustain our environment. They will look at 'good' and 'bad' rubbish, the different types of bins we use at school, and how different materials can be upcycled.

Grade 3 students were drafted into teams at the beginning of the term by the teachers that are coaching, they were presented with their jumpers on Friday. It would be great if parents could send along a spare pair of clothes in case students end up getting muddy and wet during their games.

# PROBLEM OF THE WEEK

Six magicians A, B, C, D, E, F live on an island.

## NUMERACY

Moreover, encouraging diverse problem-solving methods prepares students for real-world situations where numbers and scenarios vary widely. This skill is invaluable as it promotes critical thinking and creativity, enabling children to see multiple pathways to a solution. As parents, supporting this approach at home by exploring different strategies with your child can significantly reinforce what they learn in school. By doing so, we equip our children with the tools they need to succeed not just in mathematics, but in all areas of life where adaptable thinking is key.

# **CURRICULUM CORNER**

# LITERACY

This term in writing our students will be looking at the words that they choose to use in their writing and how by choosing more specific and precise language their pieces can be greatly elevated. By encouraging children to move beyond general or overused words, we enable them to express their ideas more clearly and effectively. This practice not only enriches their writing but also enhances their ability to convey precise meanings and emotions. For instance, instead of using "happy," a student might choose "ecstatic" or "content," depending on the context. This attention to detail can significantly impact the quality of their writing, making it more engaging and vivid.

Moreover, exploring a broader vocabulary prepares students for various academic and real-world scenarios where precise language is crucial. By actively seeking out new words and understanding their nuances, students can better articulate their thoughts and ideas. As parents, we can support this development by encouraging reading at home, discussing new words, and playing vocabulary games. By fostering a love for words and their meanings, we help our children become more confident writers and communicators, ready to succeed in all areas of life where effective expression is key.

# Reading at Home

I just asked a classroom filled with grade 1s and 2s how many of them read at home. You might already know the answer, and I thought I had a good idea what kids would say, but I was shocked.

Half of the kids read at home. And a quarter said they listened to someone read to them at least once a week.

This was pretty heavy. For me, as a Literacy Teacher, I know the value in reading to your kids, and that's what I want to share with you.

When you read a story to your children, firstly they LOVE the connection and attention. They love that someone wants to sit with them and just read and explore the inside of the pages together. When Grandma picks up a storybook about 'The Best Granny' or when Dad reads the Chronicles of Narnia each night before bed, kids eat it up. This is connection building at its best. It makes those core memories that we all think back to.

There is also well documented evidence of vocabulary development. Books include words that we don't often say out loud, such as, "they gnashed their terrible teeth", but whilst turning the pages of Where the Wild Things Are, you're sure to find these beauties. When children converse with us, they are getting plenty of casual conversation, but when do they hear formal language or figurative language?

I think there is some ideas that once kids start to read, they no longer need to be read to, and maybe that's right. But what if they still love that connection? What if they still want to explore a new world within the pages with you? What if they can expand their vocabulary through stories?

If you're up for a challenge this term, try something new with books. It could be to begin a novel with your child, listen to an audiobook in the car, find a stack of picture books at the library and read them, or just read your favourite story from when you were a child.

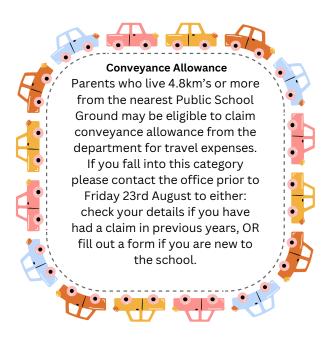

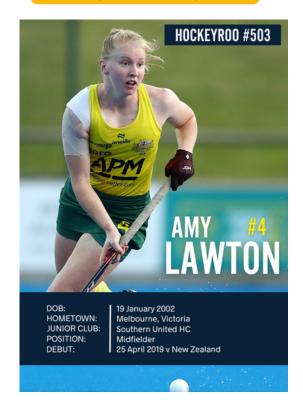
# Have your circumstances changed?

# What you need to know.

#### Who is SSR?

State Schools' Relief is a not-for-profit organisation that works closely with all government schools across Victoria. Each year State Schools' Relief provides assistance to families experiencing financial disadvantage with school uniforms and footwear.

#### Introduction to Camps, Sports and Excursions Fund

Through government funding the Camps, Sports and Excursions Fund (CSEF) was established to provide payments for eligible students to attend camps, sports days and excursions. To find out more, or to apply for assistance, please refer to the Department of Education and Training website.

#### SSR offers a uniform package every year to all Prep families/carers eligible for CSEF funding.

#### 2024 Prep Uniform Package for CSEF recipients

Prep students for 2024 that are recipients of the Camps, Sports and Excursion Fund (CSEF) automatically qualify for the uniform package and/or voucher.

#### What's in the package?

The 2024 package contains the following items:

Outerwear x 1 pce (i.e., jacket / parka / puffer)
Tops x 2 pcs (i.e., windcheater / polo shirt / rugby top)
Pants x 2 pcs (i.e., trackpants / leggings)
Socks x 2 packs
Pair of Shoes x 1

#### Please note:

- a) PE items are not included as part of this package
- b) Shoes must be requested in UK sizes (please see our shoe size conversion chart here)

#### Cost to families

Where State Schools' Relief is unable to provide a uniform item directly that contains a logo (due to contractual agreements with uniform retailers) you will receive a **voucher for \$85** that subsidises the cost of the items. The voucher can be redeemed at your child's school uniform shop, or independent uniform retailer.

Please note: vouchers do have an expiry date and must be used before this date.

#### How do I apply for the CSEF Uniform Package?

Applications are made through your child's school. Please refrain from contacting State Schools' Relief directly as staff are unable to accept applications directly from parents/families. Should you have any questions, or wish to apply for assistance, please speak directly with your child's school.

#### How do I receive the uniform package?

- 1. All items and/or vouchers provided by SSR will be delivered directly to your child's school. The school will then contact you to arrange handover of these items and/or vouchers.
- 2. The voucher will advise whether you collect items from the school uniform shop or a retailer. If it's a retailer, please check with your school to find out the nearest store.

#### Please note:

Vouchers are not transferable and cannot be exchanged for cash. State Schools' Relief does not make cash payments to schools or parents/families.

## What you need to do.

Your child's school will be in contact with you regarding the 2024 uniform package. Please fill out the 'Prep CSEF Uniform Package 2024 Order Form' and return it to the school in order for them to submit the application.
